There is now some better news for those property owners, the market indicates we reached the bottom of the market in 2013 and prices are now rising.

Price drops of -12%, -11% and -5% in 2011, 2012 and 2013 have seen a considerable turnaround of +18% in 2014.

Road cycling has become very popular in this country over the last number of years, it is a healthy and fun family activity but not terribly exciting for some of the more adrenaline junkies of the family, Lucan BMX club is about to change all that.

The club hope to open their new purpose built BMX Track this month, once a few remaining details have been ironed out by Fingal County Council.

There is something here for all the members of the family with current riders ranging in age from 4 to nearly 50.

The new facility has been built to International standards and when fully open will host club, national and hopefully international events. The club will also organise introductory days for beginners for both male and female. This is a fantastic new amenity and the people of Lucan and surrounding area who are lucky to have this on their doorstep.

The track will be operated by volunteers from both BMX Ireland (The Cycling Ireland BMX Commission) and the local community who have joined together to form **'Lucan BMX Club'**.

The clubs main focus is will be to promote the sport and attract new riders and volunteers from the local area. The plan is to open the facility on Saturdays and Sundays and a couple of evenings during the week (volunteer dependant). **Lucan BMX Club** has qualified Cycling Ireland / British Cycling BMX coaches, first aid officers and child protection officers on the committee, basically all the personnel to facilitate a safe and fun environment.

The driving force behind the project has been Eamonn Wyer from BMX Ireland and Hans Visser of Fingal County Council who have both been on hand over the two years from the initial phone call to the opening event. Funding for the track was provided by a Leader grant, BMX Ireland fundraising and private sponsorship.

Ireland's World BMX Champion Kelvin Batey designed the track and has been on site numerous times during construction. Kelvin has just returned from the UCI BMX World Championships in Holland where he came away with a Silver and Gold medal in two different

classes, a brilliant achievement for him personally and for Irish BMX in general.

Currently club membership is €50 for the first family member, €40 for the second, €30 for the third. The facility and club are a non-profit operation where membership fees will go to funding track maintenance, utilities, insurance, race costs and many other items.

Every week or two since building this BMX track commenced my two boys (7 and 11) drag me down to St. Catherine's Park to check progress, now that the opening is imminent they have been practising their moves on kerbs, jumps made of planks and bricks, race tracks on the local greens and the latest and hottest event in town - bicycle polo using hurleys and a tennis ball. I have been tempted to grab my bike from the shed and join in this particular activity. My only invited participation so far by the teams has been to bring my lawn mower to the local green to mark out the pitch by cutting the grass in the outline of a pitch – thanks lads!

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The Sun & Your Skin

IT MAY BE COLD WET AND GREY BUT YOU STILL NEED SUNSCREEN EVERYDAY!

As another cold and wet week draws to an end and the two weeks of summer sunshine are a distant memory, I bet everyone has put the sunscreen away.

Now is the time to be vigilant. Damage to the skin is caused by UV rays. They are at their strongest in June and July when the earth is tilted most towards the sun. The potential for damage is not related to the temperature outside.

So even if you're sitting in the park under rain clouds you need sunscreen. The clouds will not absorb UV rays.

Latest research has found that sun lotion may not hinder vitamin D as much as first thought. Yes, we do need UV exposure but just five to ten minutes daily on your face and hands is enough. So there are no excuses not to put sunscreen on every day.

Sun cream will only last two years. If it has gone off, it will become runny or clumpy. There is no difference in effectiveness between cheap and expensive products as the sun protection factor must be made according to legal requirements. The average adult needs 3ml, about two thirds of a teaspoon on each arm, also same for face and neck and double that for legs and torso.

All sun lotion needs to be reapplied every two to three hours, depending on your skin. Children and babies should always have factor 50 applied. And if in doubt, apply more!

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YOUR AUGUST GARDEN

Plant holiday care.

If you are going away on holiday and there's no one to water your plants in the greenhouse or conservatory, then it may be worth considering one of the many watering devices available while away such as Watering Mats, Micro-drip Watering System & Timer Set, Watering Spike, Adjustable Drip Feeder.

In the case of containers and hanging baskets it is well worth moving them to a situation where they are shaded and out of full sunshine.

Lawns

If you would like a fine finish to your lawn then cut more than once a week. Any weeds should be removed and, if required, the holes filled with a gritty compost followed by a small amount of grass seed being raked in.

When the weather is dry and hot, ideally the grass should be kept slightly longer by setting the blades a little higher.

After being away on holiday you will want to cut the grass but to avoid any stress to the lawn it is best to do this gradually.

Prepare sites for new lawns, as towards the end of the month and into early September is an ideal time for sowing. The area should be level, free from large stones and weeds.

It is very important to remove perennial weeds as these will be difficult to control until the lawn is established.

Where perennial weeds are growing on the site, spray with a weedkiller containing Glyphosate some weeks before commencing soil cultivations. This will allow any re-growth to be treated for a second time.

Patio Pots, Baskets and Containers

Thoroughly water at least once a day making sure the compost doesn't dry out completely.

As compost can become bone dry in smaller terracotta pots than larger plastic pots any water will run straight off.

It is, therefore, ideal to place pots, baskets, containers in a bowl, bath or even water butt leaving them in soak thoroughly for a short while.

Also, just because it may rain, the compost could still remain

dry due to foliage not allowing the water through.

Vegetables

As many varieties of peas and beans come to fruition, the challenge for gardeners is to replace them with some more productive plants so consider onion sets or garlic?

Sowings can also be made of spring cabbage, chinese cabbage, corn salad, winter lettuce and radish.

The spread of potato blight can occur if conditions are hot and humid, therefore, to prevent attack it may be worth considering using a fungicide spray.

The tips of any climbing shoots of runner beans should be pinched out should they reach the top of the supports.

Any crops that are in flower, have fruit or pods on them must be watered well.

The side-shoots on tomatoes should be pinched out regularly and the leading shoots tied to the supports.

A high potash tomato fertiliser feed should be applied weekly and don't let the plants go short of water.

Fruit

Keep well watered during dry spells and weeds under control by hoeing.

Cut down canes of summer fruited raspberries that have finished cropping, tying in new canes to supports and removing any spare ones.

The runners of new strawberry plants should be secured into pots of compost or soil allowing them to root.

Main shoots and side shoots of gooseberries can be pruned back to five leaves encouraging fruiting shoots for next season to be produced.



Flowers

For colourful pot plants in the home, plants of cactus, cineraria, cyclamen, coleus and schizanthus can be raised from seed sown this month.

Wild Flowers are becoming popular and sowings of cowslips and primroses should be made in trays, placing in a cold frame.

Now is a good time for cutting plants such as achillea, grasses and other everlasting subjects as they are at their peak. They should be hung upside down in an airy, warm place so that they can dry naturally ready for using in arrangements.

Use bamboo canes to support stems of tall perennials and lilies.

Deadheading of roses should be done regularly, and flowers trimmed just above the top leaf on the stem. Stem cuttings can also be taken for propagating.

Pond Care

It may prove necessary to increase the amount of oxygen to fish and plants during thundery weather in which case leaving the fountain running overnight will prove helpful.

This is an ideal time to clean out any empty water-butts so that any dirt that may be trapped at the bottom is removed.

Use a net to remove any dead flowers or leaves.

Overgrown pond plants can be thinned, and it may prove useful to take note of any waterlilies which will require dividing next spring.

Feed fish regularly, taking care not to over-feed, with a varied diet to build them up. Any food remaining in the pond after ten minutes should be removed.

To help aerate the water and keep fish healthy top up water levels.

Oxygen can be increased by letting water gently fall into the pond from a hose at a height approximately 1m (3').

If you haven't a fountain then a gentle spray using a hose over the surface from time to time will prove beneficial.



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Ferrets - The Right Pet for You?

Ferrets are lively, playful and easily tamed, but they need a lot of space and can be expensive to feed. They can also inflict severe bites and emit a strong musky smell. Before getting any pet, you should think very hard about whether you can provide everything it needs.

What do Ferrets need?

- Companionship to be with other ferrets and to have human company.
- A diet of raw, fresh meat twice a day.
- Any uneaten food must be removed daily.
- A constant supply of fresh, clean drinking water in a drip feed bottle with a metal spout.
- A large home that is kept up off the ground, in an open shed or indoor area out of direct sunlight and strong winds.
- Separate areas inside their home.
- A deep, clean layer of fresh meadow hay for bedding. They also like to curl up in an old jumper or socks and are very fond of an old slipper to curl up in.
- Toys to play with, like cardboard tubes and wooden cotton reels.
- Their home to be tidied every day and thoroughly cleaned every week.
- A very large, secure area to play in.
- Injections to prevent certain serious diseases.
- To attend a vet if they are ill or injured.
- To be looked after when you are away on holiday.

Life Span:

Ferrets live for about eight years.

Behaviour:

Ferrets need to be with other ferrets and it is best not to keep one ferret on its own. Either male or female ferrets from the same litter can live happily together. Although ferrets can appear very tame, they are not easy to look after as they need a great deal of space and may try to escape.

Handling:

Pick up a ferret gently but firmly using both hands, one around its hindquarters and the other around the shoulders. Hold it close to your body. It is important to handle ferrets regularly to keep them tame.

Breeding:

It is strongly advised that you do not breed from ferrets as it is very difficult to find good homes for the young. The best way to ensure that ferrets do not breed is to have them neutered or for them to have a hormonal injection that prevents them remaining fertile. Female ferrets come into season (a time



when they can get pregnant) from early spring until September. If you keep female ferrets, they will become sexually mature at about eight months old, and you should seek expert advice on their care before this stage.

Health:

Ferrets must be vaccinated against the potentially fatal disease canine distemper. Your veterinary surgeon will be able to advise you on this. If the ferrets' home is left in direct sunlight, ferrets can suffer from heat exhaustion. They should recover if moved to a cool dark room and given plenty of water, but the situation is easily avoided. Ferrets can catch the influenza virus from humans, and you should keep away from ferrets if you have flu. Keep an infected ferret away from the others and seek veterinary advice straight away.

If a ferret is constantly scratching, producing bald patches in its fur and broken patches in its skin, it may have mange. Seek veterinary advice straight away. Ferrets can suffer from parasites (tiny living things which live on other creatures) if their bedding is not kept clean. Check ferrets' ears and coats regularly and seek veterinary advice if there is any sign of mites. If you have any concerns about the health of your ferrets, ask your veterinary surgeon for advice

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
